Update

Treasurer's Report

At the April Kirk Session meeting it was agreed that that the finance team will prepare a 5 month actual + plus a reforecast for the year and this will be presented to the June Kirk Session meeting.

The only point to make would be to reiterate the challenge around gift aid and Small Donations Scheme (GASDS). With the union our total small donations exceeded the limit and so we will not be able to claim the gift aid which the individual legacy congregations have done in the past. The solution to the problem is for tax payers to ensure that they make any donations via FWO or ideally Standing orders. A letter about this accompanies this magazine highlighting this and the Ministers will include references to the request in their congregational addresses.

SPRING CLEAN

In our ever-changing climate it feels like our seasons are changing too. March and April this year did not feel very spring like. It seemed like the rain would never stop. Endless days of grey skies and a distinct unspring like chill in the air meant my winter jackets stayed at the front of my wardrobe. Slowly, ever so slowly at the start of May the air temperature has risen. Hopefully, by the end of the month spring will have really sprung.

Yet, despite the unseasonable weather there has been the renewal, the replenishment and rejuvenation that heralds the arrival of spring. It is a time of new beginnings and change is afoot.
